First Year Tutors Light Lunches – March/April 2016

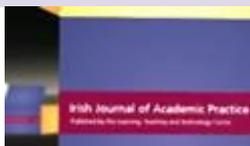


Are you a 1st Year tutor or involved in teaching 1st years? If so, we have another 'light lunch' series you won't want to miss!

Teaching Tip of the Month - Vote for Learning!



On a topical theme this month, we are highlighting polling and voting as a way of engaging with students, particularly in larger groups.

Techniques for polling your students inside or outside their classes have mushroomed in recent times. Not all involve technologies. In no particular order of preference, here are some suggestions with some links to help you find out more:

1. [Clickers](#) – the ask-the-audience approach, where each student has a handset and your questions are incorporated into regular PowerPoint slides.
2. [Socrative](#) – used as an app or via its website. This allows you to have qualitative as well as quantitative answers from students, and collates them in real-time to your screen.
3. How about paper instead of phones or clicker devices? [Plickers](#) allows you to set up questions and gather responses by scanning QR-coded paper handouts held by your students. Takes a little practice but cost effective!
4. Add a poll to your [tweet in Twitter](#) – simple and very popular.
5. Muddy Points: give each student a post-it note and ask them to jot a point they have not fully understood before leaving class. The Post-its are stuck to a flip-chart sheet or board as they exit the room, so the points can be clarified at the next class.
6. Run a survey with [Google Forms](#) in class – results are collated anonymously and automatically and can be reviewed on-screen.
