DIT Spring Academy – Video in Education

DIT's Learning, Teaching & Technology Centre, with the support of the National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning, is delighted to host the very first Spring Academy on *Video in Education*, Wednesday 18th to Friday 20th February.

This 3-day event at DIT Aungier St offers participants an opportunity for hands-on training and practical advice in the production and use of video in higher education. Topics covered include screencasting, lecture capture, presenting to camera, emoderating, video production and editing (a final schedule will be available from next week). The guest speaker is Professor Gilly Salmon, the Pro Vice-Chancellor of Education Innovation, at the University of Western Australia, who is renowned for her contribution to the discussion around the use of new technologies in education. The guest workshop facilitators will be [Dr. Eugene O'Loughlin](#) (NCI) and [David Quin](#) (IADT) both of whom have a vast amount of experience in the area of video in education specifically. Also, we will be linking live over the course of the three days with our Spring Academy partners at NUIG and WIT who will be running similar workshops locally.

DIT Graduate Attributes Toolkit



The DIT Graduate Attributes policy was approved by Academic Council in November 2013. It was agreed that by 2015, all programmes would provide their students with opportunities to become:

- **Engaged:** Civically engaged, socially responsible graduates with an international outlook who contribute meaningfully and positively in their professional, community and social environments.
- **Enterprising:** Graduates who have the skills, knowledge and attributes needed to apply creative ideas and innovations and to find practical solutions.
- **Enquiry based:** Graduates with a spirit of curiosity and a desire to learn, motivated to draw upon existing knowledge, generating new

ideas, seeking out learning opportunities, exploring the application of theory to practice and actively creating new knowledge

- **Effective:** Effective, highly skilled and confident graduates with the capacity to achieve desired results, believing that they can make a positive difference.
- **Expert in chosen subject discipline:** Graduates with the professional knowledge and capacity independently to practice, reflect, review and build upon disciplinary expertise and judgment.

Webcourses Upgrade

Webcourses is one of DIT's most heavily used systems: since September 2014 it has been accessed by almost 17,000 individual DIT students and staff, with up to 7,000 logging in every day. Webcourses operates in the Blackboard 9.1 environment and on Wednesday 14th January was upgraded to the most recent version of the software, Blackboard October 2014. The upgrade went smoothly and has facilitated improvements to the webcourses wiki tool, SafeAssign, Flickr and Blackboard Collaborate. While the upgrade has been a success, a very small number of minor issues have been reported. 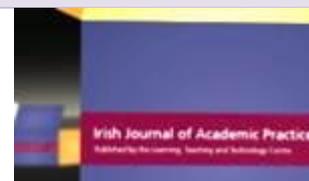
Research Corner
